1988 Fairchild Weston Technology Symposium Right Around The Corner


In 1983, Mr. Louis H. Pighi, President of Fairchild Weston Systems, Inc., initiated an annual technology symposium to give recognition and support to the development of technology within Fairchild Weston Systems. Since the first symposium, held at the deSeversky Conference Center in Old Westbury, New York, the symposium has grown in size and stature. Data Systems Division has been chosen to host the Sixth Annual Technology Symposium in Sarasota on October 20th, 1988. This year's symposium is expected to have over 250 attendees with 25 to 30% coming from outside organizations.

The Symposium will be held at the Van Wezel Auditorium, the Hyatt Hotel and the bayfront campus of the University of South Florida at Sarasota. The keynote address will be given by Mr. Howard Neal of the Schlumberger Austin Systems Center with other invited papers by John Mallinson, noted authority on magnetic recording, from the University of California at San Diego, Dr. M. Dancygier of Schlumberger Montrouge Research Center, and Guy Lelandais of DAR, Velizy, France. Other Fairchild Weston speakers include Ralph Wight, Technical Director of the Electro Optical Systems Group, Mike O'Brien and Ken Coonce of Data Systems Division. Poster papers will be presented by Louis Andreotta, Steve Crabtree, Mart Dismukes, Jim Fillion, Wayne Lockwood, Bill Mandakis, Phil Van Atta, and Bill Waggener, Jr. of DSD, Steve Chew of ESD and Tom Traynor of EOS.

A number of other DSD employees are actively involved in organizing the symposium including Jim Horvath, Beth Jenkins, Joe Lehmann, Mike Salone, Bill Shaw, Julie Soderquist, Bill Waggener, Sr., and Jon Wolf.

A number of high level Schlumberger executives are expected to attend the one-day symposium which will be highlighted by the annual award to the 1988 Fairchild Weston Key Technologist at the symposium luncheon. Mr. Pighi will present the Key Technologist award to the Fairchild Weston technologist who has been selected by his or her peers as the individual within FWSI who has "made significant technology contributions" to FWSI. The DSD nominee for this year's award is Joe Lehmann of SPS who has been recognized within DSD as an outstanding technologist who is exceptionally well qualified for the FWSI Key Technologist award. Past winners of the award include Ralph Wight, Ken Hoagland and Rudy Dyck of EOS, Irving Hirshberg of FWSI corporate and Bill Waggener of DSD.

Data Systems Division Gets Major Program Underway

Data Systems Division has recently received the official license by the U.S. State Department to begin work on a **Telemetry Flight Test Center System** for Yugoslavia. The program is estimated to bring in revenue in excess of \$6.6 million with the first shipment being made in approximately 14 months. The total project should be delivered in three shipments over a period of 18 months. The data acquisition project will allow both airborne and ground stations to communicate real-time data from a new aircraft that is a joint French-Yugoslavian venture.

EAP Program Continues to Help Many at FWSI

Are you having problems coping with stressful situations? We all can find ourselves there at one time or another. The **Employee Assistance Program (EAP)** is one benefit that the company has provided for the employees to help in times of stress.

Ken Kinzie and Holly Burcenski, both professional counselors of the EAP, have been available to all employees and their family members for two years. If you are unfamiliar with the EAP program, the following (Continued on page 3)

information will help explain what the EAP is and how it can help you:

Some personal problems can cause an adverse effect on job performance and personal health in general. The EAP is a free service to employees and their families who may have family or marital distress, financial trouble, nervous or emotional disorders, alcohol or substance abuse problems, poor physical health, legal problems, or other concerns. The EAP counselors are easy to talk to and are not judgmental of their clients' problems. All sessions are confidential and are not recorded on your employee record.

The counselors will try to help the client determine what the particular problem may be and how to cope with it effectively. No situation is too big or too small to discuss.

The EAP may not be able to solve every problem, but the program is successful in over 80% of the cases referred. Through April of 1988, over 147 FWSI employees and their family members have used the EAP.

Each client is allowed up to three sessions. If more help is needed the EAP will refer the client to outside counselors or other agencies for additional assistance. The EAP will assist the client in finding additional help by taking into account items of importance such as location, cost of treatment, and insurance coverage (if applicable).

If you would like to make an appointment with the EAP, or just have a question, please contact Ken Kinzie or Holly Burcenski here at the plant on the first, third, and fourth Tuesday of the month from 8 AM to 1 PM, or the second Tuesday of the month from 1 PM to 4 PM.

Juanita has been with the company for 11 years and is a Repair Coordinator in the Aviation Recorder Department. She is married with three children and two grandchildren.



New Contract Awarded To FWSI By Naval Air Systems Command

Frank Bloechl, Manager of Contract Manufacturing has informed us that Fairchild Weston has received a \$4 million contract from the Department of the Navy, Naval Air Systems Command to build AN/AQH-7 Recorder/Reproducer Systems. There are also options for an additional \$4 million for future procurements by the Navy for this system. The total number of systems obtained was 56 with an additional 50 systems as options.

The system is designed for recording, storage and reproduction of Sonar data and will be used on the Navy's

P3C aircraft. Shipments are scheduled to begin the latter part of 1989.

This is a special contract with all drawings supplied by the Navy. We are to "Clone" an existing system being supplied to FWSI by the Navy. This is our third contract manufacturing recorder program. The first one was the USH/32 and the second was the ASH-33/A.


